## President Sirisena's remarks at the 69<sup>th</sup> Independence Day Anniversary Celebrations



Today our country completes sixty-nine years of freedom from colonial rule. I am very happy that we can celebrate this occasion with much grandeur. Given that today we are celebrating our 69th year of "freedom" from colonial rule, it is worthwhile to explore what this concept of "freedom" means. As far as I know,

more than 6000 languages are spoken by various nationalities living in countries across the world. In all those languages, the word "freedom" is accorded great importance.

There is a difference in what "freedom" meant during the era between 1505 and 1948 – when we were under foreign rule - and what it means today. D.S. Senanayake and his fellow national leaders from all communities - the Sinhalese, Tamils and Muslims - led the national struggle for freedom. During that struggle, there were occasions when our national leaders were imprisoned. Thousands sacrificed their lives during the era of 1505-1948 fighting against colonial rule. On this Independence Day, we should remember the noble sacrifices made by these heroes.

During the 1930s and 1940s, the Donoughmore and the Soulbury Commissions introduced in response to the demands made by the leaders of this country, succeeded in addressing some of the major grievances of the people. This paved the way for the country to win independence on February 4th, 1948.

We are aware that "freedoms" today – human freedoms, media freedom, right to expression, right to thought and right to peaceful assembly, among many others – are vast.

Their families suffered heavily. The country's economy was ruined. Almost 100,000 persons including civilians perished during the conflict. We should remember these lessons.

During the visit, U.S. Navy Sailors joined their Sri Lankan counterparts in sports and cultural exchanges, and shared tactical training for rescue and ship inspections at sea. The USS Hopper crew also enjoyed the hospitality and culture of Sri Lanka. In addition, Sailors travelled to Galle to help repair and restore the All Saints Cemetery, which includes the graves of John Black, who was appointed in 1850 as the first U.S. Commercial Agent to Ceylon, and his wife Isabel.

## SRI LANKAN AMONG ASIA FOUNDATION DEVELOPMENT FELLOWS OF 2017

### JAMES W. GAIR, PIONEER OF SRI LANKAN STUDIES IN THE U.S., NO MORE -CORNELL CHRONICLE

James Wells Gair, Ph.D. '63, professor emeritus of linguistics who throughout a long and distinguished career produced groundbreaking work on South Asian languages and their relation to other languages, died Dec. 10 in Ithaca. He was 88.

"Jim Gair was in many ways the paradigmatic Cornell linguist," said John Whitman, chair and professor of linguistics. "He had a language passion for Sinhala, the language of Sri Lanka, and he threw himself entirely into it, teaching the language, writing textbooks for its learners, and analyzing both the colloquial language and its classical texts.

He helped to build and sustain Cornell's South Asia Program, directing it from 1970 to 1977. His scholarship steered the program to its continuing commitment to Sri Lankan studies and its preeminent place for Sri Lankan studies in the world, establishing the first and only Sinhala language program in the Western Hemisphere.

### SRI LANKA'S 'KITHUL' PALM Syrup: An Ancient Sweetener In Need Of Saving - NPR

The story of Sri Lanka's most beloved sweetener starts with the kithul, or fishtail, palm tree and a tapper, like 58-year-old Amuvita Gamage Dayasena.

The slightly built farmer sharpens his knife on the fallen branch of a tree and climbs up a wooden lattice that he has tied to one side of a kithul tree in his garden. Within minutes, he is on the top of the nearly 40-foot-tall tree, making sharp incisions at the base of a cluster of flowers that droop down from a branch like a bunch of grapes. Dayasena ties a jute sack to the base of the cluster to collect droplets of sap trickling down.

He will collect the sap over several days and boil it down over an open wood fire, until it reduces to a sticky and intensely sweet syrup the color and thickness of honey. *More:www.npr.org*
