We are indeed honoured by the presence of Ambassador Alice Wells, Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for South and Central Asian Affairs and a large gathering of distinguished guests on this occasion which is a manifestation of the close friendship between Sri Lanka and the United States. Incidentally, 2019 also marks the 71st Anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations between our two countries.

Today, fellow Sri Lankans, both, at home and abroad, are united in celebrating their 71st Anniversary of Independence with a sense of pride, optimism and renewed hope as we mark yet another important milestone in our country's destiny. Moreover, supporting institutions and rural communities, training opportunities and capacity building, disaster mitigation and relief, mine clearance are some of the priority sectors that continue to receive US assistance that have been of significant benefit to Sri Lanka over the years. Such notable assistance include, donation of the US Coast Guard Cutter, The recent Foreign Military Financing grant 39.5 million dollars and the Millennium Challenge Corporation Compact Programme 5 year grant which is in the pipeline. Sri Lanka also has benefitted substantially from its exports to the United States which is Sri Lanka's largest export market accounting for over a quarter of exports which continue to grow exponentially over the years. We are ever grateful to all our friends in the international community including the United States for supporting Sri Lanka towards the realization of our national goals and aspirations.

Excellencies, guests, dear ladies and gentlemen,

Sri Lanka – US multifaceted relations have reached a milestone and can be further harnessed to its true potential in the years to come. For instance, the number of Sri Lankan students coming to the

United States for further studies is clearly on the rise. There is a steady flow of Sri Lankans embracing United States as a land of opportunities. On the other hand, the number of American visitors to Sri Lanka has surpassed the 75000 mark in 2018 which continues to grow in all probability. The largest ever trade delegation from the United States in 3 decades is scheduled to visit South Asia including Sri Lanka in May 2019. This ever growing people to people contact bears testimony to the close friendship enjoyed by the two countries and their peoples, which goes without saying that the U.S is a friend indeed.

While, we continue to engage our interlocutors and friends here in Washington DC, our Honorary Consuls serving elsewhere, do a fantastic job as Sri Lanka's Honorary ambassadors to promote relations between our two countries in all spheres of interest.

Our Chief Guest, Ambassador Alice Wells is an accomplished and versatile diplomat with a proven track record.
